Annie WAUGH buried in this grave was the wife the Reverend **James Charles WAUGH**. Her name full name was Anna Johanna and had previously been married to **John Kestell HASWELL**. He had died in 1857 in Knysna where he was the conservator of the Crown Forests. (See below for more on the **HASWELL family**.) Anna Johanna had been born **Anna Johanna KUYS** on 20 Oct 1833, the fifth child of **Willem Cornelis KUYS** and **Maria Rolina Johanna VAN LIER** (abt1791 – 18 Sep 1853). Both the KUYS and VAN LIER families were well-connected at the Cape.

The KUYS Family

The stamvader/ progenitor of the KUYS family – originally spelt Kuijs – was the Rev. **Johannes Abraham KUYS**, born in the Netherland at Vreeswijk in 1756 and who died at the Cape in 1798. He had married **Maria Hendrina Roelanda HEYNING** (17 Mar 1757 – 25 Aug 1838) on 2 Nov 1777. They had six children:

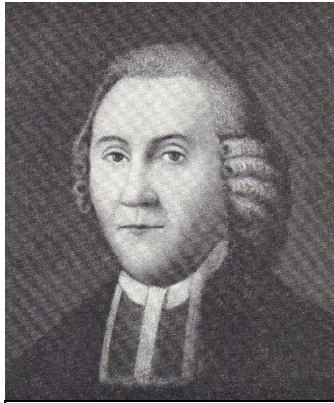
1. Arnoldus Philippus KUYS (1779 – 1832)
2. Maria Isabella KUYS (1782 – 1790)
3. Aletta Marthis KUYS (1784 – 1867)
4. Daniel Johannes KUYS (1786 – 1880)
5. **Willem Cornelis KUYS** (1790 – 1883)

Willem Cornelis KUYS was born, according to his Death Notice, in Tulbagh (Waveren). He married **Maria Rolina Johanna VAN LIER** (abt1791 – 1853) on 24 Apr 1815 in the DRC in Cape Town. They had the following children:

The VAN LIER Family

The Stamvader/Progenitor of the VAN LIER family was the Rev. **Helperus Ritzema VAN LIER** a well-known DRC pastor at the Cape. Dr Gerdrië van der Merwe on the website www.gemeentegeschiedenisargief.co.za has written the following on him (in Afrikaans and translated with google translate):

Rev. Helperus Ritsama Van Lier was pastor at the Cape from 1786 to 1793. He was exceptionally clever, fond of books, with an insatiable thirst for knowledge. At fifteen he obtained his doctorate in philosophy at the University of Groningen in North Holland. He was critical of the Bible and sometimes doubted the existence of God. But in 1785 he came to a powerful conversion and was strongly influenced by Rev. John Newton's evangelical direction.

On 8 October 1786 he became the third co-teacher at the Cape. His colleagues were Rev. JP Serrurier and Rev. C Fleck. People were religiously indifferent and debauchery was commonplace. Van Lier's sermons made a great impression and he preached the Gospel purely, with an emphasis on regeneration and forgiveness of sins. He made regular home visits and started teaching catechesis to activate people for Kingdom service. In 1788,

Van Lier founded a pray-and-work association, which strongly favoured charity, mercy and education in Cape Town. Under his ministry, the dynamic Machtelt Schmidt and the rich widow Margaretha Anna Mollier were converted, women on whom the congregation could rely for decades.



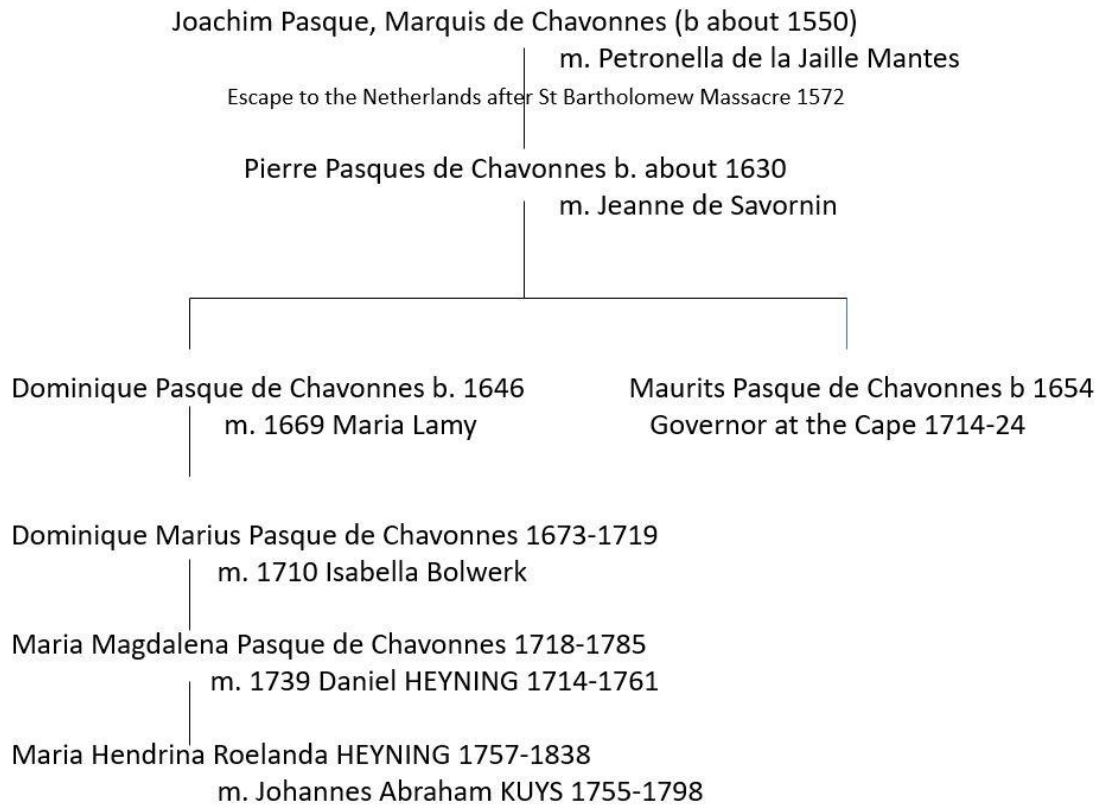
In 1791, Van Lier started a local missionary campaign at the Cape. The light of the Gospel reached the slaves and local tribes. His spiritual books touched men deeply and in his time the congregation grew spiritually. After only seven years in the congregation, he died of tuberculosis on March 21, 1793 at the age of 29. He is buried under the oak trees in Ravesberg Avenue in Newlands,

where his grave can still be seen. His life story shows that a young, inspired minister can make an irreversible impact at congregational level, especially when it is done with vocation awareness, faith and commitment. We thank God for this spiritual giant's work at the Cape. It still inspires us today.

Ancestors on the maternal side of Willem Cornelis KUY'S Family

Willem Cornelis KUY'S mother was **Maria Hendrina Roelanda HEYNING** (17 Mar 1757 – 25 Aug 1838). Her parents were **Daniel HEYNING** (17 Jun 1714 – 14 Jul 1761) and **Maria Magdalena Pasque de CHAVONNES** (11 Apr 1718 – 1785). Her mother was born in Batavia and died in India. Her family – the De CHAVONNES, were heavily involved in the DEIC (VOC) including **Maurits Pasques de CHAVONNES** who was Governor at the Cape 1714 to 1724.

With the help of an email from Rosemary Van der Vyver with some ancient documents attached and also her entries on www.geni.com for the DE CHAVONNE family, I've managed to great a direct line from Maria Magdalena Pasques de CHAVONNE to **Joachim Pasques the Marquis de Chavonne** born about 1550 in France who managed to escape the St Bartholomew Eve Massacres in 1572.

John Kestell HASWELL comes from a Devon family with strong Royal Navy connections. His grandfather, father and older brother served in the Royal Navy as did one of his sons (see below George Gray HASWELL).

John Kestall HASWELL was the fourth child of **William Henry HASWELL** and **Ann KESTELL**. He was born in either late 1819 or early 1820 as he was baptised at St Andrew's, Stoke-Daniel, Plymouth on 13 Jan 1820. In the register his father is listed as being a Lieutenant in the Royal Navy.

I could find no record of John's training as a forester or when he came to the Cape Colony but in the *cape of good Hope Almanac and Annual Register* he is listed under the George District as 'Superintendent of Crown Forests' (1848 & 1849 editions) or 'Conservator of Crown Forests' (1853 Edition). He received £144 p.a. plus an allowance for two or three horses.

Anna Johanna KUYS's father was the Justice of the Peace in George. She married **John Kestell HASWELL** in the Anglican church in George (presumably St Mark's) on 22 Oct 1850. John Kestell HASWELL was Thirty years old while Anna KUYS was seventeen and required her parent's permission to marry.

Johan Kestell and Anna Johanna HASWELL had four children before John Kestell HASWELL's death on 10 Feb 1857 at his residence in Belvedere, Knysna. He was only 37 when he died.

The children of John and Anna HASWELL were:

1. **William Henry HASWELL** born: 1851. No baptism found for this child. On 11 Feb 1873 he married **Maria Charlotte CURREY** in the Cape Town Dutch Reformed Church. They had one child according to William's Death Notice- John HASWELL. On NAAIRS there is a reference to a memo dated 1888 from John HASWELL 'concerning his late brother William Haswell'. William Henry HASWELL died on 28 Mar 1888 in Somerset West. His occupation is given as 'Chief Constable of Paarl'. His son John (b 1876) died 3 Jun 1900 in the 'Lunatic Asylum' on Robben Island.

2. **John Pigot HASWELL** born 11 Sep 1853 and baptised 21 Oct 1853 at St Mark's, George. On 4 Jul 1876 he married **Alida Johanna Sebastina LEIBBRANDT** at the DRC Cape Town. John Pigot HASWELL died on 6 Feb 1902 in his residence in Kloof Street, Cape Town. On the Civil Registration of Death his occupation is given as bookkeeper. There appears to be no Death Notice or Estate File. His wife, Alida died in 1948 aged 93 years and she left her Estate to the sole surviving son, Hugh Charles HASWELL but the Death Notice does say that there three other children who predeceased her. They were
 - a. **George William HASWELL** b 23 Jul 1877 and he died 3 Nov 1897 single aged 20y.
 - b. **Susan Frances HASWELL** b 30 Jan 1879 and she died 22 May 1941 – never married.
 - c. **Hugh Charles HASWELL** b 14 Oct 1880. He died 30 Jul 1962. He married Annie Cole DAWSON in Durban in 1908 and they had the following children (on his Death Notice of 1962)
 - i. **Avis HASWELL**. Entered as **Lady Avis FRASER** on her father's Death Notice. No further information found on internet except for her marriage to Henry FRASER in London
 - ii. **John Gray HASWELL** b 12 Dec 1912. He married Joan Ethel Maud BARRY on 29 May 1937.
 1. Three possible four children found
 - iii. **Hugh HASWELL** b 1919 Baptism found but no further information found and he does not appear on father's Death Notice so most probably died young.
 - d. **Anna Henrietta HASWELL** b 31 Mar 1883. She married Australian born Ernest Albert Graham and had four children with him. She died 23 Oct 1939
3. **George Gray HASWELL** born 5 Mar 1855, baptised 21 Mar 1855 in George Anglican church. He joined the Royal Navy and had the following service: Enter RN 3 May 1869 (abt 14y); 20 Dec 1875 Act Sub Lt. to RN College till Jun 1878; 20 Mar 1876 Sub Lt.; 10 Aug 1881 Lt. Served on numerous and various ships and bases including courses in Gunnery and Torpedoes; 5 Mar 1900 Placed on retirement list; during WW1 served as coastal Watch officer in Norfolk; 10 May 1918 returned to Retired list; 13 Jun 1919 Promoted to Captain for War Service. He married **Edith WHITE** in Cork. They do not appear to have had any children.
4. **Mary Kate HASWELL** b 23 Jan 1857 died 16 Nov 1857, She is listed on her father's Death Notice as female child unbaptised.'

Rear Admiral George Henry HASWELL – Brother of John Kestell HASWELL

Mention should be made of John Kestell HASWELL's brother George Henry HASWELL. His Naval Career is given below. William Henry Haswell R.N.

The WAUGH family

Mention also needs to be made of James Charles WAUGH's ancestors and the descendants.

Anna Johanna HASWELL married **James Charles WAUGH** on 10 April 1860 in St George's Cathedral with Bishop Robert Gray officiating. James Charles WAUGH was born in 1832 and was baptised on 7 Nov 1832 at the Wells Scotch Church in Marylebone, London. His family, going back to great-grandfather, were from Scotland – Gordon, Berwickshire, Scotland and many were ministers in the Church of Scotland – hence his baptism in the Wells Scotch Church. His father was **James Hay WAUGH** of Brixton later entered the ministry of the Church of England and was Rector of Corsley, Wiltshire.

James Charles WAUGH, after attending Trinity College, Oxford where he matriculated in 1850 and obtained his BA in 1854 came to the Cape on board the *Norman* in 1859. His ordination dates are a bit confusing. Wim De Villiers's book, *Messengers, Watchmen and Stewards*, which contains short biographies of all clergy licensed in the Diocese of Cape Town has James Charles WAUGH's ordination merely as a question mark. In Crockford's Clerical Directory of 1868 (one of the few online) it has 'Deac. 1855 by Archbishop of York' but there is no mention of ordination to the priesthood. Nor is any mention made of what he did from 1854 till 1859 and his arrival at the Cape.

While at the Cape he seemed to "fill-in" during the absence or suspension of other clergy. From 21 March 1859 until 1861 he was licensed as Curate and Priest-in-charge, during the absence of the Revd W F Taylor on leave (from March 1859), of St. Matthew's, Riversdale. He was acting Priest-in-charge of St. John the Baptist's, Schoonberg, during the absence of the Revd Hermann Hirsch (1859-1860) and served as Missionary (paid by Society for the Propagation of the Gospel) at the Caledon Mission, and was Master of the Grammar School in Caledon (1860-1861). From 1861 till 1863 he was Vice-Principal of Diocesan College ("Bishops"), Rondebosch and during that time was the Officiating Priest of St. Paul's, Rondebosch, following the death of the Revd John Fry in 1862. He also filled in at St. Peter's, Mowbray, during the deprivation of the Revd William Long (1862-1863).

It was during this last period of his time at the Cape that his wife, Anna "Annie" Johanna WAUGH died. She had given birth to a son **James Hay WAUGH** in Caledon on 4 Feb 1861 and he was baptised at holy Trinity Caledon on 24 March 1861. He, like his father, became a priest. He was named after his grandfather, James Hay WAUGH senior (1797-1885)

James Hay WAUGH senior had another son, **Alexander WAUGH** (1840-1906). Alexander became a doctor in the West Country who bullied his wife and children and became known in the Waugh family as "the Brute". He had two sons, **Arthur WAUGH**, the eldest was a publisher. He married Catherine RABAN (1870–1954) in 1893; their first son **Alexander Raban WAUGH** (always known as Alec WAUGH) was born on 8 July 1898 and on 28 October 1903, the couple's second son was born. On 7 January 1904 the boy was christened **Arthur Evelyn St John WAUGH**, but was known in the family and in the wider world as Evelyn WAUGH. Therefore, the writers Alec and Evelyn WAUGH are great-grandnephews to James Charles WAUGH.

On **James Charles WAUGH** return to the UK¹ he became curate of Wroughton and it was in 1865 he married **Beatrice LEE** in Whitchurch, Shropshire. In the 1871 and the 1881 Census he is listed as curate of Wroughton. From the Census record it appears that he took in pupils to teach. In 1871 Census he and wife, Beatrice had three children in addition to James Hay WAUGH. They are

1. **Charles Eustace Alexander WAUGH** born Jun Q 1866, died Sep Q 1894. In the 1891 Census, Beatrice WAUGH, now widowed, moved in with her step son, James Hay WAUGH (although on the Census she is listed as Mother of the Head of the Household). Beatrice's three children were still living with her. Charles Eustace Alexander WAUGH was 24 years old, his sister Eva Mary was 23 years old and William Lawrence was 20 years and listed as 'Student at Oxon'. Charles Eustace Alexander WAUGH died in August 1894 and was buried on 23 August 1894 in the graveyard of St Peter the Great Worcester.
2. **Eva Mary WAUGH** born in Dec Q 1867. She married **Francis William HOLMES**, also a clergyman, on 4 Sep 1900 at St Martin's, Worcester. In 1901 census they were in Poplar, London. The 1911 Census Francis had a living in Lunedale, Yorkshire. Two daughter were born in this marriage. No record found of the couple in the 1921 Census. Eva Mary HOLMES born WAUGH died 13 May 1923 at the home of her brother William Lawrence WAUGH in Chisledon, Wiltshire.
3. **William Lawrence WAUGH**. Born Mar quarter 1871. He studied at Shrewsbury School and at Keble college, Oxford where he obtained a BA in 1895 and a MA in 1898. He did his theological training at the Ely Theological College in 1895 to 1897 and he was ordained Deacon in 1897. A year later he was priested by the Bishop of Salisbury. He was curate of St Martin's Salisbury 1897-1901 and the Curate in charge of Draycot Foliat from 1901 to 1912 and again from 1915-1922. He served as Diocesan Inspector of Schools 1905 to 1918 and Rural Dean of Marlborough 1917-1925. From 1909 he served as Chaplain to the Forces (Territorial Army). [*I am not quite sure what 'Surr. 1917' means - the abbreviation table of Crockford's Clerical Directory says 'Surr.' is surrogate but surrogate to what?*] In 1901 he was appointed Vicar of Chisledon with Drayton Foliat and Rector of same from 1923 in the Diocese of Salisbury. Crockford in the early days gave the patron and income of the living. The patron of the Chisledon was Major General Calley who had two turns to appoint a priest and the Eastman Trustees who had one turn. The Tithe Rent Charge was £206 with 74 acres of Glebe giving a gross income of £502 and a net income of £408 and a house. The population of the parish was 1611. William Lawrence WAUGH married Edith Mary CALLEY, presumably a member of the CALLEY family who were patrons of the living. They married in 1902.

James Hay WAUGH junior son of James Charles and Annie WAUGH

James Hay WAUGH was born in Caledon on 4 Feb 1861 and baptised in holy Trinity Caledon on 4 Mar 1861. Two of his godparents were George Ogilvie Headmaster at Bishops and the Rev H. M.M. Wilshire, who was the Rector of Caledon where James Hay WAUGH was the missionary.

After the death of his mother, James Hay WAUGH went with his father to the UK, where he was educated by his father who ran a preparatory school in the Rectory at Wroughton. From 1879 he attended Keble College, Oxford matriculating in 1879 and obtaining a BA in 1885 and a MA 1887. He was ordained deacon in 1885 and priest in 1886 by the Bishop of Gloucester & Bristol and was curate at St Catherine's, Gloucester (1885-1889). He served as a minor canon of Worcester Cathedral 1889-95 and curate of St Martin's Worcester 1890-95. In the Sep Quarter 1895 he married Agnes Mary Geraldine SWAN in Bridgwater Somerset. From the Census records, it does not appear that they had any children. James Hay WAUGH was rector of Harvington 1895-1907; vicar of St John the Baptist, Bedwardine 1907-1923. Agnes Mary Geraldine WAUGH born SWAN died 18 Apr 1922. In 1923, James Hay WAUGH moved to St John's Bretforton where he remained until his death on 15 April 1941 aged 80y.

James Charles WAUGH died on 12 Mar 1883 and was buried on 16 Mar 1883 in St Mary's Graveyard, Hasfield, Gloucestershire. He was 50 years of age. In 1881 he had been appointed rector of Ashleworth, near Tewkesbury in Gloucestershire. His second wife Beatrice LEE who was the daughter of solicitor John and his wife Mary LEE of Whitchurch, Shropshire. In the 1851 Census she was a pupil at a boarding school for girls at Belmont, St Chad,

¹ One wonders what happened to the HASWELL children. Did they stay with the KUYS in George or come to Cape Town with their mother? After the death of Annie, James Hay WAUGH junior returned to the UK with his father but the HASWELL children appear to have stayed at the Cape.

Shrewsbury, Shropshire run by Mrs Sophia PROSSER, wife of a Church of England minister, William PROSSER. In the 1861 Census she was now 26 years old and back at home with her parents in Whitchurch, Shropshire. On 26 Jul 1865 she married the widowed James Charles WAUGH in Whitchurch. After his death in 1883 she seemed to have moved in with her stepson, James Hay WAUGH who was also a clergyman living in Worcester at the time – 1891 census. She died on 29 Oct 1899 and left her estate of over £2000 to be shared between William Lawrence WAUGH, her son and Eva Mary WAUGH, her daughter.
